Dr. Pedersen's letter inspired me to write some Thanksgiving thoughts of my own. In these times, it is important to reflect on all there is to be thankful for. I am thankful for my family, friends, and my generally privileged circumstances. Here at Lawrence, I am sincerely thankful for having colleagues who are both true professionals as well as supportive friends. I am likewise blessed to work in a building where the Administrative Team unfailingly provides support, understanding, and encouragement. Most of all, I am daily reminded that our students, while increasingly in greater need of academic and other supports, give me more respect, amusement, and agreeableness than I deserve. I love Lawrence!

BUT . . .

When I agreed to come to Lawrence in 2001, it was because the pay was about 30% more than what I was being paid in NYC. Today, NYC teachers make about as much as Lawrence teachers but receive more benefits.

Since I mentioned the old days, let me take you back to 2010. Hurt Locker won the Oscar for best picture. Tik Tok by Ke\$ha was the most popular song. The Lakers were NBA champions. The Saints won the Super Bowl as The Who headlined the half-time show. We will never forget the trapped Chilean miners, the horror of the Haitian earthquake, or the brave Tunisians who started the Arab Spring. Oh, what a year it was!

2010 was also the last year Lawrence teachers had an unexpired contract. The top salary under that contract was and remains \$130,000. Adjusted for inflation, this equates to \$108,865.54 today. To many of my colleagues, this amounts to a real and painful decline in their standard of living.

Moreover, besides the real and often ignored financial impact, what really hurts is the disrespect that the BOE's demands and lack of action represent. For me, this feeling may run deeper than for many. I was born in the Soviet Union and came to the United States when I was nine. While I was too young to really feel the full weight of that system, there are certain things you absorb. What still resonates is the disparity between what is said and what is obvious. In the Soviet Union, harvests were always "great," yet we waited in line for potatoes. We lived in a "worker's paradise," yet couldn't always get toilet paper. We lived in the "freest country in the world," yet my parents were afraid I would repeat, in school, something politically incorrect that I picked up at home.

So...now when I read or hear about how much we, as teachers, are appreciated or what a great job we are doing, it makes me uncomfortable. Slogans that do not match reality trigger me in a way that may almost be unfair to the sloganeer. What I said at the outset remains true - I am grateful to work at Lawrence. But, when I hear false or empty praise, contradicting the reality of our situation, my eyes roll so hard I sometimes give myself a headache and, as we know, a headache is a COVID symptom. I want to do a good job, but worry that the Health App will make me stay home.

When we look back on 2020, let us make it memorable not just for all the obvious reasons, but for being the year when Lawrence teachers finally got a new contract.
